Participants will learn about forest management techniques including how tree marking can improve your overall forest health, assess tree defects, understand forest terminology and choosing a logging contractor. Our afternoon field trip will focus on advantages of a managed vs. unmanaged forest.

Following a pancake and sausage lunch with local maple syrup, join us for the afternoon field trip to visit a 1200 tap family sugar bush operation.
